RETURN OR ONWARD TICKET

A return or onward ticket, or other proof of onward transportation to a country to which the passenger has right of entry, is required of all visitors.

PASSPORTS

A Passport is the required document for entry into Bermuda and is required of all visitors from countries that require a Passport for re-entry purposes or for entry through another country to which the passenger has right of entry.

PROOF OF CITIZENSHIP AND IDENTIFICATION

All travellers must carry with them proof of citizenship and personal identification (including government issued photo ID) relevant to a return to their own country or for re-entry through another foreign country, as required by Bermuda Immigration authorities. This applies to adults and children travelling alone or with their parents. See 'Requirements for Children' for additional notes concerning children who are travelling with an adult other than a parent and/or are in the process of adoption.

Visitors from the USA must present a valid, machine-readable U.S. Passport. In effect since the 8th January 2007, U.S. citizens, including infants and children, returning to the U.S. must have valid Passports. Since this date, a Passport is the only recognised travel document for American travellers returning to the U.S.

Visitors from Canada must present a valid, machine-readable Canadian Passport, in effect since the 1st May 2010.

Visitors from the U.K. and Western Europe must present a valid, machine-readable Passport from their country.

- NOTE:**
- Foreign citizens not in possession of a Passport may be refused entry into Bermuda;
 - Driver's licence is not acceptable as proof of citizenship;
 - Neither Bermuda nor US Immigration Authorities accept a notarised copy of a hospital birth certificate, or similar non-government document as proof of citizenship;
 - Married women whose identification documents are in their maiden name but who are travelling under their married name should also carry their marriage certificate or certified copy as further proof of identity.

REQUIREMENTS FOR CHILDREN

Children travelling with an adult other than a parent must be in possession of a Passport along with a letter from a parent authorising the adult to accompany the child for the trip.

Parents of adopted children should be particularly careful that they carry with them the proper documents for their adopted children, especially if the children are of a different nationality. Parents in the process of adopting children are advised not to leave their country with the children until all the legalities and paperwork have been finalised. Children entering Bermuda for the purpose of adoption must be in possession of documents from the Bermuda Department of Immigration confirming they have been cleared for entry into Bermuda.

LENGTH OF STAY

Most bona fide visitors with a confirmed return ticket and place of accommodation will have no difficulties with Bermuda Immigration Control. There is a special Secondary Immigration Control section at the airport to deal with any arriving passengers who are in unusual circumstances. Bermuda Immigration authorities may restrict length of stay, for example, passengers arriving with an open return ticket will have a time limit imposed upon them. An application to extend the length of stay must be made in person either at the Secondary Immigration Control on arrival, or with an Immigration Senior Inspector at Immigration Headquarters in the City of Hamilton between 9:00 a.m. and noon on any working day — no appointment required.

Passengers who arrive with only a one-way ticket into Bermuda will not be admitted unless prior Bermuda Immigration authorisation has been given. People wishing to enter Bermuda for the purpose of residence, employment or for an indefinite period will not be permitted to land unless they have prior authorisation from Bermuda Immigration authorities to do so.

Visiting Yachts and their Crew: With effect from 1st June, 2011, visiting yachtsmen and their crews will be granted a maximum three month stay on arrival in Bermuda. In keeping with best practice and standard immigration policy, visiting yachtsmen and their crew will be required to provide:

- proof of citizenship;
- financial means to repatriate themselves by air (if required);
- proof of health insurance; and
- a declaration not to seek or take up employment in Bermuda.

The fee for this extended stay is set at a nominal \$250.00 for each member of the crew and each passenger. Extensions for up to a further three months will also be permitted on application to the Department of Immigration and the fee is \$100.00.

VISAS

Nationals of the following countries require Bermuda entry Visas:

Afghanistan, Albania, Algeria, Angola, Armenia, Azerbaijan, Bahrain, Bangladesh, Belarus, Bolivia, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Bulgaria, Burma, Burundi, Cambodia, Cameroon, China (People's Republic of)*, Colombia, Congo (Brazaville), Congo (Kinsasha), Cote d'Ivoire, Croatia, Cuba, Cyprus, Republic of (northern part of), Djibouti, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Egypt, Eritrea, Ethiopia, Gambia, Georgia, Ghana, Guinea (Rep. of), Guinea-Bissau, Haiti, India, Iran, Iraq, Jamaica, Jordan, Kazakhstan, Kenya, Korea (Democratic People's Republic of), Kosovo, Kuwait, Kyrgyzstan, Lebanon, Lesotho, Liberia, Libya, Macedonia (Former Yugoslav Rep. of Macedonia), Malawi, Moldova (Rep. of), Mongolia, Montenegro (Rep. of), Morocco, Myanmar (Burma), Nepal, Nigeria, Oman, Pakistan, Palestinian Authorities, Panama, Philippines, Qatar, Romania, Russian Federation, Rwanda, Saudi Arabia, Senegal, Serbia (Rep. of), Sierra Leone, Somalia, South Africa, Soviet Union (former), Sri Lanka, Sudan, Swaziland, Syria, Tajikistan, Tanzania, Tunisia, Turkey, Turkish Rep. of N. Cyprus, Turkmenistan, Uganda, Ukraine, United Arab Emirates, Uzbekistan, Venezuela, Vietnam, Yemen, Yugoslavia (former Soc. Fed. Rep. of), Zimbabwe.

* Holders of Hong Kong Special Administrative Region Passports or British National (Overseas) Passports do not require Visas for Bermuda.

NOTE: An exception will be made for a visitor who has a valid Passport and proof of a right to reside in the United States, Canada or the United Kingdom. For an American resident, that means a Permanent Resident Card (Green Card) is required. A Canadian resident must have a Canadian Permanent Resident Card. A United Kingdom resident must be able to show that no limit has been placed on his or her stay in the United Kingdom. Those who require Visas to enter other countries on departure from Bermuda must have those Visas prior to arrival in Bermuda.

Visas to enter Bermuda may be obtained from the Visa Section of a British Embassy, British High Commission, British Consulate or other British Foreign Service establishment abroad. For more information visit www.immigration.gov.bm.

STATELESS PERSONS

Stateless Persons (persons who have no national status) should be in possession of a document and Visa allowing them to return to the country from which they departed, or to another country willing to accept them on a residential basis.

RESIDENT NON-BERMUDIANS

Resident non-Bermudians who are employed in Bermuda must use their "Work Permit and Entry/Re-Entry Permit" document to get back into Bermuda. Dependent family members who wish to reside in Bermuda without a work permit, must obtain a Dependent's Entry/Re-Entry to Bermuda permit through the permit holder's employer before arriving in Bermuda.

EMPLOYMENT

Employment in Bermuda of non-Bermudians is prohibited without the permission of the Minister of Labour, Home Affairs and Housing, and possession of a Work Permit. Visitors to Bermuda are not allowed to accept any form of employment, nor are they allowed to seek employment and/or permission to work while they are on the Island.

DOMESTIC HELP

Those who wish to import their own domestic helpers may not do so without first advertising the vacancy three times in local newspapers. If no Bermudian can be found to fill the vacancy, then the prospective employer must apply to the Chief Immigration Officer in writing in advance of arrival.

SALESMEN ENTERING BERMUDA

Refer to the section on Salesmen's Permits in the Information Sheet entitled, 'Customs Regulations - Bermuda'.

NON-BERMUDIAN ENTERTAINERS

The hotel, nightclub or other organisation importing such people for temporary employment must apply in advance and in writing to the Chief Immigration Officer. If non-Bermudian entertainers wish to bring with them photographs, recordings or other materials for sale, they must obtain Immigration permission to do business in Bermuda and must also pay a non-refundable duty on the items involved.

The foregoing gives a general outline of Bermuda Immigration procedures. There are a number of exceptions under the Bermuda Immigration and Protection Act 1956, for example, in relation to Civil Servants and their dependants. In case of doubt, applicants should refer to:
